The Philadelphia Medal

The Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame honors the most significant individuals in the history of Philadelphia sports, as well as native sons and daughters who have achieved excellence beyond the region. Inductees include athletes, coaches, and other key contributors, with significant figures in sports media inducted under the Hall's "Legacy of Excellence" designation.

The Hall of Fame's highest honor and most distinguished induction, the **Philadelphia Medal**, is for individuals whose contributions are so consequential and enduring that they transcend the realm of day-to-day sports.

In its 22-year history, the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame has only two Philadelphia Medal Inductions:

- **Ed Snider** (2005), whose vision brought the National Hockey League to Philadelphia, established a world-class arena for the Flyers and founded Comcast-Spectacor, one of the nation's leading sports & entertainment enterprises.
- **Ed and Steve Sabol** (2011), pioneers who revolutionized sports media through the creation and development of NFL Films, one of the most influential entities in the history of sports storytelling.

As part of its 2025 Inductee Class, the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame proudly and unanimously selects **Jeffrey Lurie** as the latest recipient of the Philadelphia Medal. As owner of the Philadelphia Eagles, Mr. Lurie has elevated the franchise to one of the most respected organizations in professional sports. His leadership and commitment culminated in delivering Philadelphia its first Super Bowl championship. Beyond the field, Mr. Lurie's visionary stewardship, organizational excellence, and philanthropic endeavors have left an indelible mark on both the Eagles and the broader Philadelphia community.

The Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame is honored to recognize Jeffrey Lurie's extraordinary legacy and enduring contributions with the presentation of the 2025 Philadelphia Medal.

2025 Inductee Class

Allen Lewis (Sportswriter) - Local - Legacy of Excellence

- Haverford College (1940) ; played on baseball and football teams
- Served in the Army Air Forces during World War II, attaining the rank of captain.
- Briefly covered the Philadelphia Warriors chronicled their 1946-47 BAA Championship
- Phillies beat writer for the Inquirer from 1946 until 1972
- Retired from the Inquirer in 1979
- Member of Baseball Hall Of Fame's Veterans Committee from 1979 until 2000
- Served as Chairman of Major League Baseball's Scoring Committee from 1960 to 1974
- Considered the foremost authority on baseball rules
- Recommended many scoring changes that remain in effect today
- Covered 24 World Series and witnessed 10 no-hitters
- Came out of retirement in 1980 to assist with the Inquirer's coverage of Phillies' World Series
- Provided a weekly baseball trivia question for Sunday newspapers
- 1998-2002: First official scorer for Tampa Bay Devil Rays

- Awarded the J.G Taylor Spink Award, gaining admission to writers' wing of Baseball Hall of Fame

Established as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation, the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame's multi-faceted mission extends well beyond honoring the region's sports history using the common bond of sports to help fund its community programs, the foundation helps area youth in numerous of ways. These community programs directly influence the lives of young people in the area. At this grass roots level, local youth are exposed to and educated about the tremendous history of sports in Philadelphia. With the fervor of the Philadelphia fan base, this broad-based, mass appeal is the prime directive behind all of the Hall of Fame's programs and initiatives. From youngsters at a Hall of Fame sponsored camp to grandparents reliving their fondest memories at an interactive exhibit, the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame with its multi-generational appeal is unlike any organization in the area.

The Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame recognizes the Philadelphia sports fan as its core audience. This robust fan base, combined with key organizational and institutional support, forms the essence of the Foundation's mission. The duality of this approach forms the basis of all Hall of Fame initiatives.

Mission Statement

The Philadelphia Hall of Fame is a not-for-profit association dedicated to honoring those individuals, teams, events, organizations and venues prominent in the history of athletics in Philadelphia and the surrounding area. The Hall recognizes the timeless intertwining of sport into the fabric of everyday life. With this as a credo The Philadelphia Hall of Fame is devoted to honoring those persons, places, organizations and events that have made outstanding contributions through inspiring achievement in both professional and amateur sports while forever enriching the memories fans.

As its mission, the Hall is committed to:

- Through enshrinement, honoring, those individuals who had exceptional careers as participants, coaches, managers, owners and supporters.
- Memorializing athletic venues of historical import.
- Honoring organizations prominent in the Philadelphia area for contributions to professional or amateur sports.
- Identifying those long-standing establishments that have served to enhance the sporting experience for fans.
- Commemorating defining moments in the history of Philadelphia sport.
- Acquisition, primarily through donation and bequest, of artifacts, memorabilia, works of art, literature, photographs and related materials that focus on the history of sport in Philadelphia and the surrounding area.
- Public edification by establishing a permanent Hall of Fame and Museum in the Delaware Valley.

- In addition to the Philly Hall, the individual Inductees represent more than 525 inductions into various halls of fame.
- The 33 Legacy of Excellence Inductees consist of TV and radio broadcasters, sportswriters, authors, announcers, and other contributors at the local and national levels.
- Less-visible, community-focused efforts are recognized by the 9 Lifetime Commitment Inductees.
- Ed Snider was the first Philadelphia Medal Inductee, enshrined in 2005, followed by Ed and Steve Sabol in 2011
- The Palestra was the first venue formally recognized by the Hall, enshrined in 2006.



Preview Gallery at Spikes

- In April 2013, the Hall of Fame opened its Preview Gallery, at Spike's Trophies facility in Northeast Philadelphia.
- The Hall of Fame's Philadelphia Sports Heritage Collection is the fastest growing, most unique collection of Philadelphia sports artifacts, memorabilia, collectibles, archival items and antiques.
- Items from the collection are available for public display at the Preview Gallery at Spikes in venue space donated by Spike's Trophies.
- The Preview Gallery now allows the Hall of Fame to present a select set of exhibits on a rotating basis, featuring artifacts, pictures, videos and historical narratives in an intimate museum-like setting.
- Current displays feature the following:
